- Easily replicated across the health care system;
- Made smart, efficient use of resources;
- Integrated team work across the health care system;
- Dealt with important priorities and challenges in the health care system.

Health Care Expo 2007 showcases innovative solutions and projects supporting the health care system in Ontario. More than 200 exhibitors and 14 high-level workshops promote important health care issues such as: health promotion, improving patient quality and safety and innovations in health human resources.

This is just one more example of how, working together, Ontarians have achieved results in health care. Other initiatives include:

- Funding about 1,270,000 additional procedures to help improve access and reduce waiting times for Ontario families;
- Creating 150 Family Health Teams composed of doctors, nurses, nurse practitioners and various other health care professionals to provide comprehensive care to more than 1.6 million patients to date:
- Funding 22 new Community Health Centres (CHC) and 17 new satellite CHCs across the province.

Today's initiative is part of the McGuinty government's plan for innovation in public health care, building a system that delivers on three priorities – keeping Ontarians healthy, reducing wait times and providing better access to doctors and nurses.

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
